CONSULTATIONS ON INDIAN REGISTRATION, BAND MEMBERSHIP AND FIRST NATION CITIZENSHIP.

The Red Rock Indian Band is hosting 2 meetings for Consultations for the collaborative Process on Indian Registration, Band Membership and First Nation Citizenship. The first meeting will be held in Thunder Bay, Saturday, November 24, 2018 at the Victoria Inn. Lunch will be served at 12 noon and the meeting will begin at 12:30. Agenda will be posted. This event will be live streamed and those watching can make a comment during the event. Login information for this event will also be posted in the coming weeks. A Ministers Special Representative from Indigenous Services Canada will be present at the meeting in Thunder Bay. Bus transportation from Nipigon, ON will be available to those who would like to attend the meeting in Thunder Bay. Details for pick up times will be available in the coming weeks. There will also be a meeting at the Lake Helen Resource Centre on Wednesday, November 28, 2018 at 6 pm for those who were not able to attend the November 24 meeting.

What are we consulting on?

We will be consulting on the issues that were brought up through the co-design process and suggestions raised from a recently created Indigenous Advisory Panel who provide advice and guidance to the government throughout the Collaborative Process. In addition to what was legislated under Bill S-3 there was the emergence of three general content streams.

These are:

1) The removal of the 1951 cut-off from the *Indian Act*

- Implementation date of the coming-into-force provision in Bill S-3 relating to the removal of the 1951 cut-off
- Resources required by First Nations for implementation
- Concerns that may require mitigation
- Evidence for proof of entitlement pre-1951

2) Remaining inequities related to registration and membership under the *Indian Act*

- Issues related to adoption
- Second generation cut-off rule
- Unknown or unstated paternity
- Enfranchisement
- Categories in Indian registration and how they are applied
- Border Crossing
- Gender identity and registration
- Registration for children of same-sex parents
- De-registration
- Issues of resources and impacts on communities

3) Devolution of the responsibility for determining membership/citizenship to First Nations

- Will there be a continued federal government role in determining Indian status and band membership?
- First Nation's authorities to determine band membership or citizenship
- Community impacts and band issues
- Self-Government/Self Determination and *Indian Act* divestment

We will also be discussing the complex issues that were brought forth in our community engagement sessions that were held at the beginning of this year.

The issues identified were:

- Blood quantum
- Border Crossing-addressing Canada as it is a problem with them not the States – the Jay Treaty
- De-facto adoptions
- CIS expiry dates

You are encouraged to attend these meetings either physically or through live stream.

These meetings are open to Red Rock Indian Band members and First Nations people who would be affiliated with the Red Rock Indian Band.


